# **Painters Online**

Frost at Midnight

This month's Editor's Online Gallery choice is *Frost at Midnight* by Lesley Birch. Lesley, who is mainly self-taught, began painting seriously in 2000, exhibiting with the Cambridge Drawing and Painting Society. She now has work on show in galleries in Scotland, Yorkshire and London. Lesley is based in York where she works from her small studio; visit www.lesleybirch.co.uk. Of her painting, Lesley writes:

"This painting was inspired by Samuel Taylor Coleridge's wonderful poem, Frost at Midnight. I studied English literature in the late '70s and there is no doubt that my love of the Romantic poets feeds into my art. Here, I've tried to capture the 'secret ministry' performed by the frost while we sleep at night with the 'silent icicles' forming under the 'quiet moon'. Time and nature have always been dominant themes for me in my landscapes. However, I try not to be too literal. I like to abstract the image.

"My paintings evolve over several months and this one is no exception. In *Frost at Midnight*, I applied gel medium with pumice using a palette knife to give the texture I required, and then I built up layer upon layer of glazes to add depth of colour. I then left it for a few months. I don't like my paintings to be too perfect. I want to see brush marks, scratches, scrapes and rag marks; this is what excites me. I love acrylic paint because I can work frantically on several paintings at a time and it dries so quickly. I depend very much upon my sketchbooks, which I was delighted to win in a Patchings Art Competition a few years ago. In these, I note down all my ideas for paintings and make rough sketches from my trips abroad and back to my native Scotland."
